Road Safety Training Courses in RS10 Countries Capacity Building for Lead Road Safety Agencies in India Workshop

Nilgiri Conference Hall, The Oberoi Hotel New Delhi, 11-12 February 2013

The World Bank, through the Global Road Safety Facility (GRSF), is fully committed to the objective of significant and sustained reductions in Road Traffic Injuries, through activities designed to accelerate and scale-up the efforts of low and middle-income countries to build their technical and managerial capacities, and implement cost-effective road safety programs. In reaching this objective, the Facility places a high priority on initiatives that help countries strengthen their road safety institutions and meet their commitments under the UN Decade of Action for Road Safety.

As part of the "Road Safety in 10 countries" project (RS10), an initiative funded by the Bloomberg Philanthropies in support of evidence-based interventions, the World Bank will be holding a two-day capacity building and information exchange workshop for Indian States that have established, or aspire to set up, a lead Agency for road safety.

What is a lead agency?

Lead Agencies can take different institutional forms, but they share the common goal of proposing aspirational targets, developing regional or national road safety strategies, coordinating efforts by all sectors of government – including those of health, transport, education and the police – and managing the process of governmental review of road safety performance.

Because Lead Agencies play a pre-eminent role in the institutional management of road safety, they must be adequately funded and publicly accountable for their performance. They must also actively engage and collaborate with all groups in society that can contribute to improved safety outcomes. Their effectiveness is considerably enhanced by strong and sustained political support for the initiatives they promote. Without these foundations in place, all other road safety institutional functions and related interventions lack cohesion and direction, and the effectiveness of safety initiatives can be undermined.

Target audience

The capacity building and information exchange workshop is open to officials from Indian Federal and State-level Road Safety Agencies & Public Administrations who have established, or have plans to set up, a lead Agency for road safety in the commonly accepted sense of the term. The workshop is designed for a maximum of 50 participants.

Expected outcomes

The workshop is designed both to elicit information from delegates on the state of preparation of their respective lead agencies and present a number of national and international best practices relative to lead agency roles, institutional arrangements, target setting, evaluation & communication functions, and resource allocation.

At the end of the workshop, delegates will have an enhanced grasp of the key characteristics of effective road safety management functions, as well as a sharpened focus on managing road safety projects for results.

The workshop will also provide a fertile discussion forum enabling the World Bank to identify priority support interventions in 2013-14.
